Modern Homes Will Be Built At Handy Heights

Lots Sold At Auction
By Housing Authority
To Birmingham Builder

The seventy-eight residential lots adjacent the new Handy Heights Urban Renewal project offered for sale by the Florence Housing Authority and the City of Florence, were purchased at public auction Friday afternoon by Garber, Cook and Hulsey, Inc., of Birmingham. The Birmingham firm whose bid was highest at \$105,400, was represented by its president, William H. Hulsey and James A. Plylar, vice president.

The bids opened at \$70,300 which was the minimum set by the Florence Housing Authority for the property and the ninth bid, \$105,400, submitted by Garber, Cook and Hulsey was accepted. Officials of the Housing Authority and the City Commission declared themselves well satisfied with the outcome of the sale to the above named firm which will construct 78 homes on the lots for sale to prospective home owners.

The homes to be built will range in price from \$8,500 to \$9,500 and will be the first FHA approved homes ever offered to Negroes locally. The developer proposes to construct them under FHA sections 220 or 221, which are long term government mortgages made available by the Housing Authority for this area.

Specifications of these homes will include three bedrooms and bath with living room-dining room combinations plus kitchen and will have some five different floor plans subject to variations. Exteriors will be of batten and board asbestos siding, cedar shakes, brick veneer, etc., and design will be conventional construction, it was stated.

Following final approval of the bid by the Atlanta Regional Office of the Housing and Home Finance Agency, actual construction must begin on or before June 30, 1958 with completion within 18 months.

A local agent will be announced by Garber, Cook and Hulsey, Inc., in the immediate future. The houses will be offered for sale completely constructed and with long term loan arrangements completed with small down payments.

Karl Tyree, Jr., Florence attorney who also served as Executive Director of the Housing Authority, presided at the auction Friday.

Plans To Combat Recession Also In The Making

An extra \$1,455,747,000 for defense was asked of Congress Wednesday by President Eisenhower principally for building more B52 bombers and missile-firing submarines. The president's request to the nation's lawmakers was in the form of a memorandum sent to the House Appropriations Committee. He specified that it be added to the defense budget for the fiscal year starting July 1. It would boost the defense budget for 1959 beyond 40 billions, it was stated.

Out of the above amount \$218 million would be turned over to the Army and \$180 million for space research programs. Also there would be \$206,750,000 for building two additional Polaris-firing submarines and \$518,500,000 to build more bombers and refueling tanker planes.

The form of allotment would be used mainly to speed up missile programs while the Navy's will be used for anti-submarine warfare programs.

Recession Discussed

The President appeared to be more encouraged with respect to the current economic slump and said the government should give careful thought to any idea of a tax cut as a means of combatting the recession. He said by using the wrong approach to the problem we could make serious trouble for ourselves. Such trouble he said, "would make the current recession look small by comparison."

As to the housing bill signed on Tuesday for \$1,850,000,000, Mr. Eisenhower sounded the same note of caution. He indicated that he favored encouraging private spending to stimulate business contending that business could not be stimulated by government spending.

He said he did not think Congress had been passing anti-recession bills too fast if the program involved is necessary.

With respect to the Defense Department Mr. Eisenhower said he felt that the secretary of defense must be given additional authority and that he plans to make clear in his reorganization plan to Congress just what the responsibility of the secretary is.

Comment On Prices

When asked to comment on Bernard M. Baruch's suggestion for cutting prices as an aid to business, the President said "there must be leadership in both business and labor if a free economy is going to operate successfully over the years." He added that he always takes seriously whatever advice the elder statesman-financier gives him.

Express Hope For Clean Campaigns

To do this is to depart from the accepted pattern of good taste, justice, fair play and good will which Alabamians have come to expect candidates to observe in campaigns for public office.

Alabamians have come to expect that a person will have his record examined as an individual, and that he campaign for office as an individual, not because he is a member of any particular religious group, not because he has any particular ethnic or cultural background. About 16,000 Voters On Lauderdale's Poll List

Decrease Of 1,000 Noted Since 1954;
Negro Voters In County Number 697

The names of approximately 16,000 voters are included on the official poll list of Lauderdale County published in today's Herald. Biennial publication of the list is a requirement of state law.

Persons who have qualified to vote but do not find their names on the official poll list should make that fact known to the probate office before a supplementary list of voters is published in a subsequent issue of The Herald. It was pointed out that the chance of error in compiling a list of 16,000 or more voters is extremely large, although clerks in the office of Probate Judge Herman K. Longshore, as well as Herald printers, took extra precautions to see that all names were listed correctly.

Frank Harrison, chief clerk in the probate office, said that this year's poll list contains about 1,000 less names than the one published four years ago. He attributed the decrease to the voter reidentification requirement of 1955, which eliminated the names of a number of persons still listed as voters here even though they had died or moved away.

Another factor in the loss of voter strength in Lauderdale County pointed out by Mr. Harrison, and concurred in by Tax Collector Weaver Fuqua, was the decline in the number of poll tax payments this year.

The number of Negro voters contained in the poll list published today is 697, or slightly more than 4 per cent of the approximate total of 16,000. No large-scale registration by Negroes has been noted in Lauderdale County in recent months, despite rumors that the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People was launching such a movement throughout the South.

The approximately 16,000 voters qualified to cast ballots in this county are distributed among 18 beats containing 33 boxes. The Florence beat lists 14 boxes, of which four are outside the corporate limits. The voting strength of the city of Florence and the rural areas is considered about equal.

Two more dates before the May 6 primary remain on which voters who are eligible except for registering may qualify themselves. These dates are the first and third Mondays of this month—April 7 and 21. Persons registering the first Monday in May are not eligible to participate in the first primary because state law does not permit an elector to vote in less than 10 days after he registers.

\$383,089 Bid Is Low On New Powell School

A low bid of \$383,089 was entered by Southern Builders, Inc., for construction of the new J. W. Powell School in Edgemont Subdivision No. 2. The bids were opened here at 2 p. m. Wednesday.

The new school will contain 37,500 square feet of floor space and include 20 classrooms, an auditorium seating 750 persons and a cafeteria.

It is hoped that construction on the Powell school can be started by April 15 and completed before Nov. 15 of the next term.

The newest school in the city of Florence's \$1,050,000 construction program will bear the name of Supt. J. W. Powell who retires June 30 after 30 years service.

Passover Feast To Be Observed

Jewish Congregation
Set Symbolical Rites
For Friday Evening

Religious growth has moved in a series of divine inspirations, progressively revealed unto man as mankind became ready to accept them. One of the most beneficent forward steps will be commemorated this Friday evening in Jewish Temples and homes with the observance of the Passover Feast.

Beginning with the Seder Supper ritual on Friday evening, those ceremonies recall God's revelation that mortal man, in order to have true religion, must have religious freedom to worship his Creator in accordance with the dictates of his conscience. Egypt's Pharaoh, as so many tyrants through the ages, considered himself as the only true interpreter of God's will in his age, forcing his brand of idolatry upon all his subjects. Then the Almighty, through Moses, gave His children this unique message, that every man must listen to His voice in his soul, and find individual salvation through God's mercy. Thus Passover is marked by special worship services stressing the theme of spiritual freedom and the sacrifice of human bondage.

These symbolical rites include the supper service, known to Jews as "Seder," and remembered in Christianity as "The Last Supper." Matsah, an unleavened bread, is eaten as a token that material pleasures are less important than religious bliss. Bitter herbs point up the message that even human suffering has a place in God's plan. Sacramental wine symbolizes the lesson of the sweat promise of eternal life after the fetters of mortal limitations will have been removed.

The Tri-Cities Jewish Congregation will gather at 6:30 Friday at Temple Israel, Florence, for its Seder Supper. Arrangements are under the supervision of Mrs. Louis Levi, with Dr. J. S. Gallinger, the Temple spiritual leader, officiating. Sam Israel, president of the congregation, and Mrs. Milburn Zeff, president of the Sisterhood, will preside.

Late News

Postponed until after a ten-day Easter vacation was the Senate's consideration of one billion dollars for long-term, low-interest loans for public works. Democratic leaders had hoped to get the measure through before the recess but went down to defeat 41 to 39. Tuesday night in the face of Republican protests against "ramming it through."

Nikita Khrushchev flew to Budapest Wednesday where he declared the Soviet Union and Hungary are "firmly united against the imperialists." Communist Party Chief Janos Kadar was on hand to lead a crowd of 4,000 in welcoming the Soviet leader on his first trip abroad since he became premier of the Soviet Union on Monday replacing Bulganin.

Cuba's second largest city, Santiago, was virtually cut off from the rest of Cuba Wednesday by Rebel Leader Fidel Castro who has been conducting an all-out revolt against the regime of President Fulgencio Batista.

Jury Gives Woman Here \$52,750 In Death Of Husband

A jury in Federal Court in Birmingham Tuesday returned a judgment of \$52,750 for Mrs. Gladys L. Holmes, of Florence, who had sued Continental Casualty Insurance Co., of Chicago in connection with the death of her husband, Oliver W. Holmes, in a plane crash.

Continental contended that its Florence agent, Musgrove Insurance Agency, was not authorized to issue the policy on Mr. Holmes' life covering him while piloting small planes. He had previously been insured only as a passenger in airplanes.

After Mrs. Holmes entered suit against Continental, that company sued the Musgrove agency, which was represented in the Birmingham trial by Mitchell & Poellnitz. The jury found that Musgrove had authority to extend coverage of Mr. Holmes.

Under Present Conditions Future Of Flagg-Utica Here 'Extremely Dim'

The outlook for the future of the Florence plant of the Flagg-Utica Corporation is "extremely dim at this time," J. T. Flagg, president and chairman of the board, told The Herald yesterday.

Mr. Flagg was contacted at his New York office regarding the company's Florence operations after the newspaper received a copy of Flagg-Utica's annual report to its stockholders.

"We are having great difficulty meeting the competition of non-union competitors," Mr. Flagg told The Herald, and pointed out that about 80 per cent of all knit and woven underwear is made in non-union plants. "In light of general business conditions, and especially the problems confronting the underwear industry, of which there are many, to say the least, the future looks extremely dim at this time. What the future holds for our operations here is not clearly predictable and only time will tell. Of course, we are hoping for the best," Mr. Flagg said.

The knit underwear industry continues to be plagued by domestic over-production and low-cost imports, and no upturn in prices or demand is in sight, Mr. Flagg, stated in the annual report.

The annual message to stockholders declared, however, that the concern which has one of its operations in Florence is "in a strong financial condition," with its net working capital \$6,038,287 at the end of 1957. This was an increase of \$255,695 above the December 29, 1956 figure, and fixed the ratio of current assets to current liabilities at 8.39 to 1. All bank borrowings, which reached a total of \$1,000,000 during the year, had been paid at year's end, the report pointed out.

Both net shipments and net profits of Flagg-Utica declined during 1957, the former by 16.5 per cent and profits from \$417,138 in 1956 to \$355,288 last year. A factor contributing to the decline in sales was elimination of products unsalable for the cost of manufacture, although this practice assisted in producing a net profit.

"Another major importance in the conduct of our

business is our relations with our employees. In this connection it is perhaps unfortunate that the textile industry is a comparatively low-wage industry; the problems of this corporation in dealing fairly with its employees are aggravated by the fact that many of our strongest competitors are not organized," the report said.

"The union representing our employees at Anniston (the Textile Workers Union of America) did not reopen the contract there so that it continues without change through 1958. This union has also indicated its willingness to discuss changes in the agreement which management feels are needed if the Anniston operation is to be made competitive. At Florence, on the other hand, the union (the International Ladies Garment Workers Union) did reopen the contract and on March 14 an agreement was finally reached providing no changes in fringe benefits but some wage increases. It can only be hoped that operational savings can be made to offset the increased production labor cost this new agreement will entail because otherwise our competitive position at Florence, especially in the face of current declines in selling prices for our products, will become even poorer. The employees at our Faith Mills subsidiary, in contrast to those in most other underwear plants, enjoyed a full year of capacity operations with resultant high take-home pay. Discussions with the union there (the Textile Workers Union of America) are now in progress but we trust that the general northern pattern of no contract changes will eventually prevail at Faith," the report continued.

A change in sales policy was instituted by Flagg-Utica during 1957, the president said, with efforts being pointed to the large chain stores and mail order houses as well as to distributors and jobbers. A sales backlog of about \$2,000,000 was reported, a drop of about \$450,000 from the previous year.

The regular quarterly dividends of 6 1/2 cents per share on prior preferred stock have been maintained. (Continued on Page 2)

Smith Sentenced To 10-Year Term

Jury Finds Him Guilty
Of Carnal Knowledge
Of His Daughter, 8

William Herschell Smith was given 10 years in the penitentiary Wednesday when a jury in Lauderdale County circuit court found him guilty of having carnal knowledge of his eight-year old daughter.

The jury, which received the case shortly after noon Tuesday and deliberated until 10 p. m. before adjourning for the night, returned its verdict about 3:30 p. m. yesterday.

Smith, father of 14 children, was charged with carnally knowing his daughter on last Jan. 4, but the state claimed that he had previously been arrested in Illinois on the same charge involving the same child when the family lived there.

Smith denied the accusation, and contended throughout the trial that his wife had abused the child. He claimed she filed the charges against him in an effort to get rid of him.

In another case which ended Tuesday, Felix Williams, Negro, was given a minimum manslaughter sentence of a year and a day in the death of George Armistead, another Negro. Williams said he killed Armistead in self-defense.

The case of the state against Mrs. Aurelia C. Nance was in progress late Wednesday. She is being tried for the killing of Thomas Wallace Rhodes, whom she claimed as her husband but whom the state said she married while wed to another man. An additional charge of bigamy has been filed against her.

Rhodes was shot three times by a .22 caliber rifle in the hands of Mrs. Nance-Rhodes at their apartment in Florence last August.

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A Job To Be Done

As trouble and tension mount in the world today we are suddenly confronted with the fact that, education-wise, we are no longer in the driver's seat. Russia has surpassed us in graduating engineers and scientists and regardless of what we may think or imagine, they are not second-rate engineers and scientists.

In an age when technological progress is nothing short of breathtaking, America, once the leader, is now running a poor second. We have been too complacent and our complacency has endangered our security. Now, leading educators admit, our educational system is in need of a major overhauling.

Because securing and training good teachers is a major problem we cannot cure this shortage of engineers and scientists overnight. It is a matter now of years to train enough teachers and equip enough schools to put this nation's production of technical personnel on a par with Russia's. Meanwhile we must do what we can to improve what we have, bearing in mind that we cannot afford to do less for other professions. We must continue to graduate lawyers, doctors, veterinarians, agriculturists, foresters, ministers, social workers, and business administrators. It takes them all to make a well rounded economy in a democracy.

In Russia where there is no democracy they have concentrated on educating engineers and scientists just as they have concentrated their industrial efforts on producing weapons for all-out war.

However the picture in America is not all dark. We have the resources in both material and manpower. We must awaken the will. We must revive the same spirit as exemplified by the late FDR during World War II when we were confronted with a shortage of airplanes to cope with Germany's famed Luftwaffe.

Mr. Roosevelt said, "we will build 50,000 airplanes in a year," and we did, proving the old adage, "where there's a will there's a way."

Tornado Season's Here--

By the end of this year an estimated 200 Americans will lose their lives in tornadoes, which usually begin their destructive descent in this section at this period. Thus it is well that residents of the Muscle Shoals district acquaint themselves with some of the known facts about this terror of nature.

One's chances of experiencing a tornado are actually pretty slight, the reason being that the average tornado path is but 16 miles long and less than a quarter of a mile wide. And many tornadoes never touch the ground, or they may touch the earth and rise again.

Before a tornado can form, there must be a conjunction of contrasting temperature, moisture, density and windflow. Cool, dry air from the west or northwest moves over warm, moist surface air, and when this occurs and is accompanied by a narrow band of strong winds at an intermediate level, a tornado may well be the result. And such combinations form more frequently in the Central and Southeastern sections of the United States than in any other parts, while the West Coast states and those immediately east of them are rarely troubled.

To know what to do when a tornado is approaching may mean the difference between life and death, and these suggestions are worth remembering:

1. IF YOU ARE IN OPEN COUNTRY: Move at right angles to the tornado's path; tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles an hour. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.
2. IF IN A CITY OR TOWN: Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS. In homes, the southwest corner of the basement usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the north and east sides of the house may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.
3. IF IN SCHOOLS: In city areas, if school building is strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remaining near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS with large, poorly-supported roofs. In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.
4. IF IN FACTORIES OR PLANTS: On receipt of a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.
5. ABOVE ALL, KEEP CALM. It will not help to get excited, and people have been killed by running out into the streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado.

Thomas Gray, 43, of Lexington, Ky., died at ECM Hospital at 7 a. m. Saturday of injuries he received March 4 when his car went off a county road north of Florence and overturned. He had been confined to the hospital since the crash suffering from internal injuries and leg and arm fractures.

His death brought to four the number of highway fatalities in Lauderdale County this year.

One man was killed and another injured Friday afternoon at Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville, when an explosion occurred in a solid propellant rocket fuel laboratory. The dead man was Lennon Corder, 33, of Huntsville. Injured by the blast was Richard Meinert, 25, also of Huntsville. Meinert's injuries were declared not serious. Officials are investigating the cause of the tragedy.

The Defense Department Friday night added a third rocket booster, the Army Jupiter, to its list of vehicles to be used in its moon probing and other outer space projects. The department disclosed it planned as many as five "lunar probes."

The Commission on Civil Rights will not go to work officially until May 15, Rep. George Andrews disclosed Saturday. If possible southern congressmen will delay the starting date even longer, it was stated. Life of the commission expires in September of next year.

The heroism of a National Airlines pilot saved the lives of 60 passengers in New York Sunday when he swerved out of the path of a twin-engined plane. Capt. Jack Guthrie, a veteran of 14 years flying service put the DC-6 into a sudden steep dive for about 1000 feet. Some of the passengers were thrown from their seats and baggage scattered but none were injured.

Byron Scroggins, a dope addict, has admitted the fatal shooting of Centreville drugist Jamie Meigs on Feb. 12. Scroggins, once a street preacher, freely admitted the shooting but declared it was accidental. He is being held on first degree murder charges and a special grand jury has been called for April 11 to consider the case.

Following Russia's announcement that atomic tests had been halted in that country, the United States Monday rejected an invitation to join in such a step. The State Department called the Kremlin move propaganda hot air.

The Nashville City School Board Monday adopted a plan designed to end school segregation at the rate of one grade per year. Desegregation of the first grades began last Fall in the Tennessee capital. The plan, if approved by the federal court would find the third grade desegregated in 1959 and the fourth in 1960.

Sen. McNamara (D. Mich.) this week announced that he had quit the Senate Rackets Committee. He told the Senate late week that the committee had "outlived its usefulness."

Blues Are Played At Handy Funeral

Florence-born Composer, Who Dies Thursday Buried In New York

W. C. Handy, famed Florence-born composer of the blues, went to his grave in New York yesterday.

day escorted by a marching band playing the mournful rhythms he loved and wrote.

The funeral of the man who, though born in a humble home in Florence 84 years ago, went on to world renown, was attended by the greats of the music world as well as civic and governmental leaders. The services were held from the Abyssinian Baptist Church in Harlem, New York's Negro section. Cootie Williams, famous jazz trumpeter who introduced many of Handy's compositions, played a solo of "Holy City," the composer's favorite hymn.

A New York Congressman, the Rev. Adam Clayton Powell, officiated at the services, and among the mourners was New York Mayor Robert Wagner.

Following the ceremony the funeral cortege rolled slowly through the streets of Harlem and then to the Bronx and Woodlawn Cemetery. Here the man who rose to fame with his "St. Louis Blues," "Memphis Blues" and countless other popular and religious compositions was buried.

Handy died in a New York hospital last Thursday night after a lingering illness. During his last years, though in failing health and blind, he was active, and in recent months had corresponded with friends and newspapers in Florence. The famous composer whose minister-father frowned on secular music and musicians moved to Memphis when a young man, and it was there that his rise to fame began from the crowded cabarets of Beale Street.

The home in Florence in which Handy lived was dismantled piece by piece when the Handy Homes project was begun and it will be re-erected as a shrine to one of the city's outstanding citizens. Some years ago Handy promised his home town the battered trumpet and piano on which he did much of his composing.

Exchangeites See New Dial System

Southern Bell Manager, Demonstrates Direct Long Distance Calling

Members of the Florence Exchange Club witnessed a demonstration at their luncheon meeting Tuesday of direct customer dialing of long distance calls to four cities in this country, Montreal, Canada, and Honolulu, H. I., a service that will be offered Florence subscribers of Southern Bell Telephone Co., at a later date.

The program was arranged by Sam Esslinger, Jr., who introduced Southern Bell's local manager, Frank Reynolds. Mr. Reynolds explained the means by which direct long distance dialing was possible, and the office of Sen. John Sparkman in Washington was dialed by Mr. Esslinger.

The connection was completed in a matter of seconds and via a loudspeaker club members heard Senator Sparkman tell Mr. Esslinger of his activities in the capital that day. George Porter, another Exchange member, then asked the Alabama senator how the President's veto of the agricultural price freeze legislation would effect farmers. Senator Sparkman said every effort would be made to override the veto, but if this is not accomplished, he predicted a further decline in the farm income.

Harold S. May then extended an invitation to Senator Sparkman to address the annual ladies' night meeting of the club but a satisfactory date was not arranged. Among cities in this country reached almost instantaneously by means of the new type of long distance dialing were Birmingham, Atlanta and San Francisco, as well as Montreal and Honolulu. Mr. Reynolds, who made these calls, explained that in the future long distance connections within the state will be made simply by dialing the number in the city the caller wishes to reach. On calls outside Alabama, the caller will first dial a prefix number before dialing the number of the party being called.

Guests of the club at Tuesday's meeting at the Hotel Reeder were Max Levinson and Alex Sloan. Don Holt, in charge of next week's program, announced that L. G. Florman, vice-president of the Southern Fabricating Company of Sheffield, is scheduled to address the club at its regular meeting. Mr. Florman will describe the background, founding, functions and operations of the Southern Fabricating Company, which, in five years, has become the largest manufacturer of hardware in the South, and in the past year has become the largest manufacturer of steel tubing in the South. After this presentation, Mr. Florman will answer questions from the floor pertaining to the Southern Fabricating Company and the general subject of industry and industrial engineering.

STATE DOCKS' UNLOADINGS INCREASE IN JANUARY

Of 45 ports located in the Atlantic, Pacific and Gulf areas of the United States, the Port of Mobile was one of nine showing an increase, rather than a decrease, in unloading of railroad cars in January, according to Austin R. Martin, executive assistant, State Docks department.

"Increased unloading of grain cars accounted for the increase," Martin stated. The North Atlantic ports showed a decrease over the same month of last year of 32 per cent. Atlantic and Gulf ports showed a decrease of 14 per cent and Pacific ports showed a decrease of 50 per cent.

President Vetoes Farm Price Support 'Freeze'

Called 'Economic Discrimination' By Hill, Sparkman In Vigorous Protest

Consistent with predictions that he would veto the price support "freeze" bill, President Eisenhower did just that Monday, calling it "ill advised from the standpoint of both the nation and our farm families."

In his veto message to Congress, Mr. Eisenhower said of his action: "With regard to government controls, what the farm economy needs is a thaw rather than a freeze."

A number of protests against the President's possible veto of the measure had come from Republican members who held that a veto would be costly in the matter of votes during an election year.

Mr. Eisenhower said that a five-point program should be undertaken to deal with farm problems. Some sections of the President's proposal made public in January in his agricultural message to Congress call for special legislation while others are possible under "existing authority."

It requires a two-thirds majority to override a presidential veto and the margin by which the bill passed both Houses of Congress was not enough to nullify Mr. Eisenhower's action.

Mr. Eisenhower said he had given earnest consideration to the bill with respect to arguments both pro and con but that in his judgment to approve the measure would be "ill advised."

The bill would have frozen price support levels at 1957 levels for a year. Also according to the President, it would have piled up more farm surpluses in warehouses; restricted the growth of markets; postponed the day when agriculture could be free of controls, it would bypass the problems of the small operator for whom price supports mean little, it would hold up needed transition to modern parity and would disregard the parity principle; it would be unfair to winter wheat growers who signed up under the 1958 acreage reserve program with the understanding that the price supports which had been announced would be the effective rates.

Protest Action
The President's action on the bill brought sharp criticism from Senators Sparkman and Hill. Senator Sparkman, saying that President Eisenhower and Agriculture Secretary Benson seem determined to force family farmers off the farm by "economic discrimination."

Senator Hill said the veto was an "unwarranted action" which marks a "sad day in the annals of American agriculture." Hill pointed to the hardships the veto would cause on Alabama and Southern cotton farmers. He said, "unless we are able to override the veto or get special legislation approved by the president, the national cotton acreage allotment may well be reduced from 17 1/2 million acres to something under 14 million acres. Alabama cotton farmers may lose as much as 176,000 acres in 1959."

Abbott Named To Vice-Presidency

The appointment of Charles H. Abbott as vice-president for marketing of Stylen Corporation, Florence ceramic tile manufacturer, was announced today by Joseph Mass, president. Mr. Abbott's headquarters will be at the firm's Milford, Mass., home office.

Mr. Abbott joins Stylen after 25 years in sales management and marketing, most recently as general manager and sales manager of the panel and door division of Atlas Plywood Corp., of Boston. Before that he was vice-president in charge of sales for General Plywood Corp., of Louisville.

Stylen Corporation has two plants in Florence, the second one completed in 1956. It is the nation's fifth largest ceramic tile manufacturer for the construction industry.

Services will be held in Weatherford, the date being unannounced at press time.

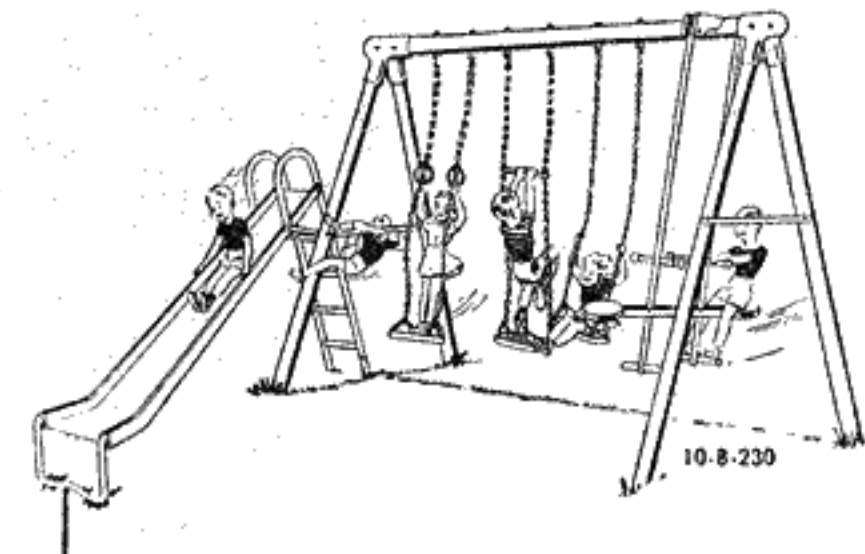

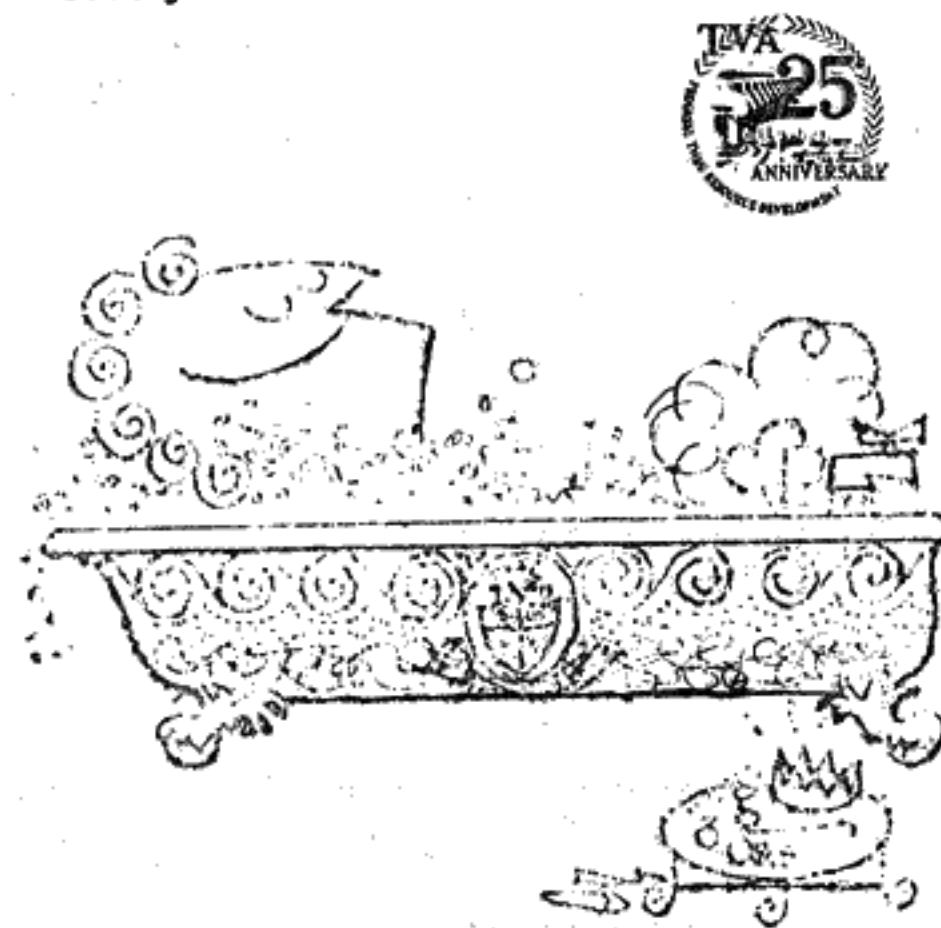

Stepped-Up Home Improvement Plan For Farms Ready

An expanded farm housing loan
program designed to speed up farm
building construction and improve-
ment as well as act as an additional
anti-recession measure was an-
nounced today by Cecil C. Mixon,
Farmers Home Administration
county supervisor.

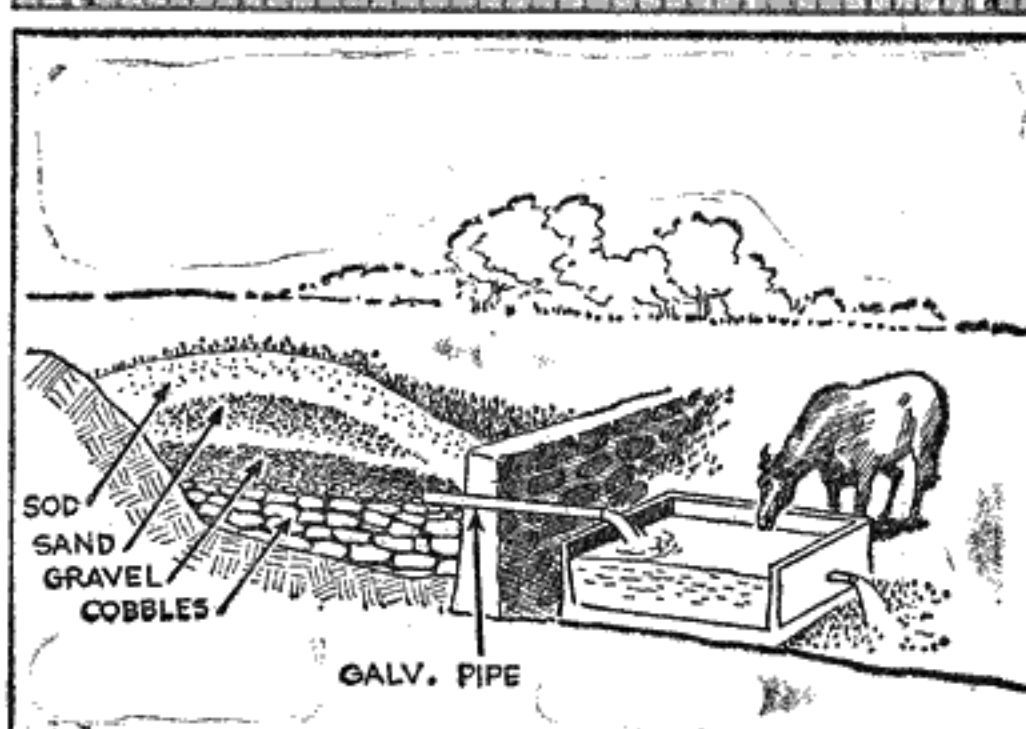
Now an owner of a farm in ag-
ricultural production and on which
the operator plans to produce at
least \$400 worth of farm commodi-
ties for sale or home use may
qualify for the 4 per cent long
term loan provided that he meets
other standard eligibility require-
ments.

Formerly, an eligible applicant
had to own a farm that produced
a more substantial part of the
operator's annual cash income.

Borrowers may use loan funds
to build, improve or repair farm
houses or other essential farm
buildings, and to provide water for
farmstead and household use. Mr.
Mixon said that in addition to
financing major construction, the
loan funds can help meet many
other needs for farm and farm
home modernization, such as add-
ing bathrooms, utility rooms, bet-
ter kitchens and many other im-
provements to the home as well
as to farm service buildings. While
tenants and farm laborers are not
eligible, the owner may borrow to
do construction work or make im-
provements for them.

The loans are made to farm
owners who need credit to finance
building improvements or repairs,
but find that adequate credit is
not available through banks or

other regular credit channels. The
interest rate is 4 per cent and loans
may be amortized over periods up
to 33 years.

Healthy Herd Key To Dairy Profits, Farmers Advised

Efficient, profitable dairy pro-
duction is dependent upon a healthy
herd.

"Yet, despite great strides that
have been made in control meth-
ods, disease organisms continue to
cut production and profits in many
dairy herds," reports Extension
Dairymen John Parrish.

"The most insidious thieves —
are chronic diseases which slip in
unnoticed and slowly eat away a
cow's ability to produce efficient-
ly."

"Mastitis causes greater losses to
dairymen than any other single
disease," Parrish said. "In the ac-
tual stage, mastitis is easily de-
tected and readily recognized;
therefore, it receives prompt treat-
ment. But the chronic form, caused
by many different organisms, is
often not recognized because few
observable symptoms develop. How-
ever, damage to the secretory
tissue occurs and changes take
place more or less gradually in the
cow's udder, depending upon the
virulence of the infection. Event-
ually the cow becomes useless, but
long before that, her milk produc-
tion and quality drop and she be-
comes an economic liability to her
owner."

"A herd that is known to be in-
fected with mastitis or any other
disease should be treated promptly
by a veterinarian," warned Par-
rish. "But, sanitary management
practices are essential for prevent-
ing and controlling diseases. These
include clean, dry bedding and
control of flies, rats, and other dis-
ease carriers."

"Milking machines should be
disinfected carefully, kept in good
running order, and used in ac-
cordance with the manufacturer's
instructions to avoid injuries to the
udders or introduction of disease
germs."

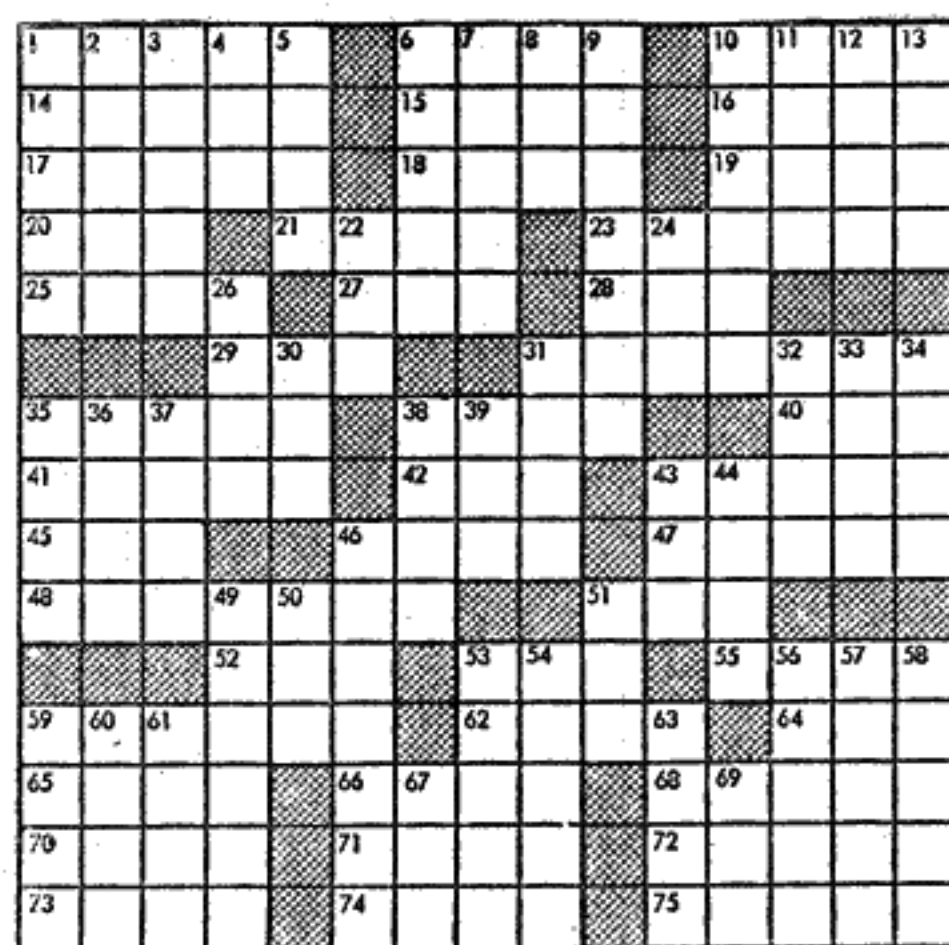

Reynolds Warns Young Rocketeers

Young rocket enthusiasts today were warned about making missiles without adequate technical supervision.

The warning came from Reynolds Metals Company, manufacturer of ballistic missile shells for the Army's Jupiter-C and Redstone.

"Airframes and other components made of aluminum are being used in the various missiles produced under Department of Defense programs, and this fact has been widely reported to the public," J. Louis Reynolds, executive vice-president, said.

"This use of aluminum by experienced missile experts should not lead amateurs to believe they can use aluminum tubing—or any other type of metal tubing—with assured safety. Tubing made from the various metals is designed for specific industrial or homecraft purposes, not for rocketry.

"Only a technically qualified person can determine whether a specific length of tubing is safe for a specific, properly designed rocket. No tubing is safe for an improperly designed rocket," Mr. Reynolds cautioned.

The average American spends about 10 per cent of his food dollar for milk and receives 15 per cent of his protein from that source.

Brucellosis-Free Purebred Hog Herds In Alabama Listed

A list of Alabama certified brucellosis-free, purebred herds of hogs has been released in Auburn by G. B. Phillips, API Extension Service hog specialist.

In revealing that 79 purebred herds are free of brucellosis, Phillips urged that farmers, 4-H club members, and others buy foundation stock from such herds. However, as Phillips pointed out, the fact that a herd is certified brucellosis-free does not mean that the animals have the breeding or bloodlines of the type desired. "A purchaser should always see the herd from which he makes a purchase," Phillips declared.

Phillips also noted that owners of certified herds must get seals of renewal every 12 months. Therefore, some of the names listed might not be up to date.

Get A Turkey For Easter Dinner

EASTER now ranks as the third biggest turkey day of the year, second only to Thanksgiving and Christmas, according to Austin Ezzell, API Extension Service poultry marketing specialist.

"Assembly-line cleaning and plucking, along with vastly improved freezing and storage methods, make turkey both available and economical for Easter family get-togethers," the specialist said. "And home economists agree that frozen turkey has the same high nutritional values, flavor and tenderness as the fresh-cooked birds remembered from grandfather's farm. In fact, some experts point out that freezing and defrosting poultry has a tenderizing effect on the meat."

Ezzell also pointed out that it is economical to buy a large turkey and have it quartered right in the store. In this way one or more of the roasts can be cooked at a time and the others kept frozen for future use.

For defrosting a quick-frozen turkey, the following suggestions are given:

1. Leave the birds in original plastic wrap. Place on shelf in refrigerator and allow two days for defrosting a large bird (25 pounds) or 24 hours for a small bird (eight to 10 pounds).
2. Leave bird overnight at room temperature.
3. Place bird, still in original wrap, under cold running water. Allow two to six hours, depending on size. Do not use warm or hot water.

As soon as the turkey is sufficiently pliable, remove the giblets and neck, usually wrapped together in parchment, from body cavity. Their removal speeds defrosting, too. Fresh or defrosted turkeys use the same cooking procedures.

The following tips are given for preparing a half or quarter of a turkey for roasting:

Rub cavity or cut side with salt. Skewer skin to meat along cut edges to hold skin to meat during roasting. Depending upon the cut to be roasted, tie leg to tail piece or tie cord around breast end to hold flat. Place turkey skin-side-up on a rack in a shallow pan. Grease with cooking fat with fat-moistened cheese-cloth. Roast at a moderate temperature (see roasting chart below). For doneness test 15 to 30 minutes before the turkey should be done according to the roasting chart. Move the drumstick or wing up and down—joint should give readily or break. Or, press the fleshy part of the roast, protecting fingers with a cloth or paper. The meat should feel very soft.

When a meat thermometer is used, it should register 190 degrees Fahrenheit placed in the center of the inside thigh muscle or in the center of the thickest meaty section.

In preparing the stuffing, allow about two-thirds cup per serving. Press lightly into greased pan or casserole, or place in aluminum foil. Cover or not as desired. Bake with turkey the last one to one and half hours of turkey roasting time.

Sheep Are Permanent On One Sumter County Farm

SHEEP may come and go on many Alabama farms, but the woolies are a permanent part of T. M. Nelson's operation in Sumter County.

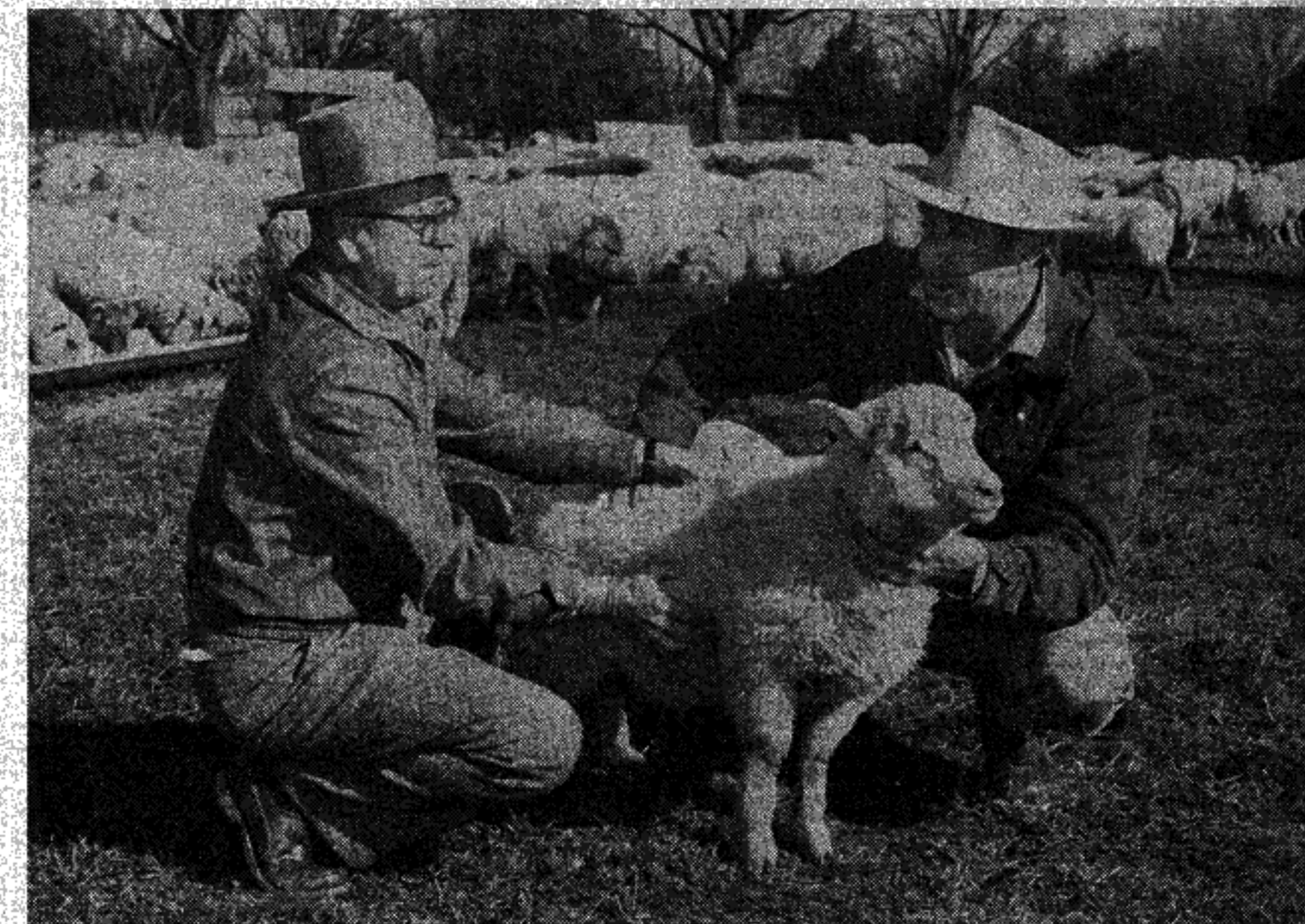
In fact, the Epes community farmer has been carrying a herd of ewes on his place for about 22 years, and he isn't thinking about cutting out this valuable source of income.

"I've increased my herd from 40 ewes to 300," says Nelson. "However, I still use mostly native females because my experience shows that they lamb earlier and are better milkers and better mothers than purebred or western ewes. To get healthy, fast-growing lambs, I cross the ewes with purebred South-down rams. And it's paying off, too, for this spring I'll market better than a 100 percent lamb crop."

"The only thing that I don't like about using native sheep," continued Nelson, "is that I have to buy replacements from off the farm. So far I haven't run into any disease trouble, because I'm careful to buy only from disease-free herds. Also, when I buy new animals, I quarantine them for at least a month, and they're subjected to a thorough vaccination program before being put into the herd."

Telling County Agent W. B. Story about the lambing program, Nelson explained that all the ewes are bred to lamb in November and December, so that the lambs will be ready for market around the middle of May. "The lambs are dropped on oat grazing and are kept there until they are ready to go," said Nelson. However, Nelson pointed out that

cold weather cut the grazing this winter, and he had to hand feed until some grass came out. "It's mighty important for the lambs to get plenty of feed," he added. "Once animals get stunted, they never seem to get over it." To make sure that the sheep herd has plenty of grazing during a normal winter, the



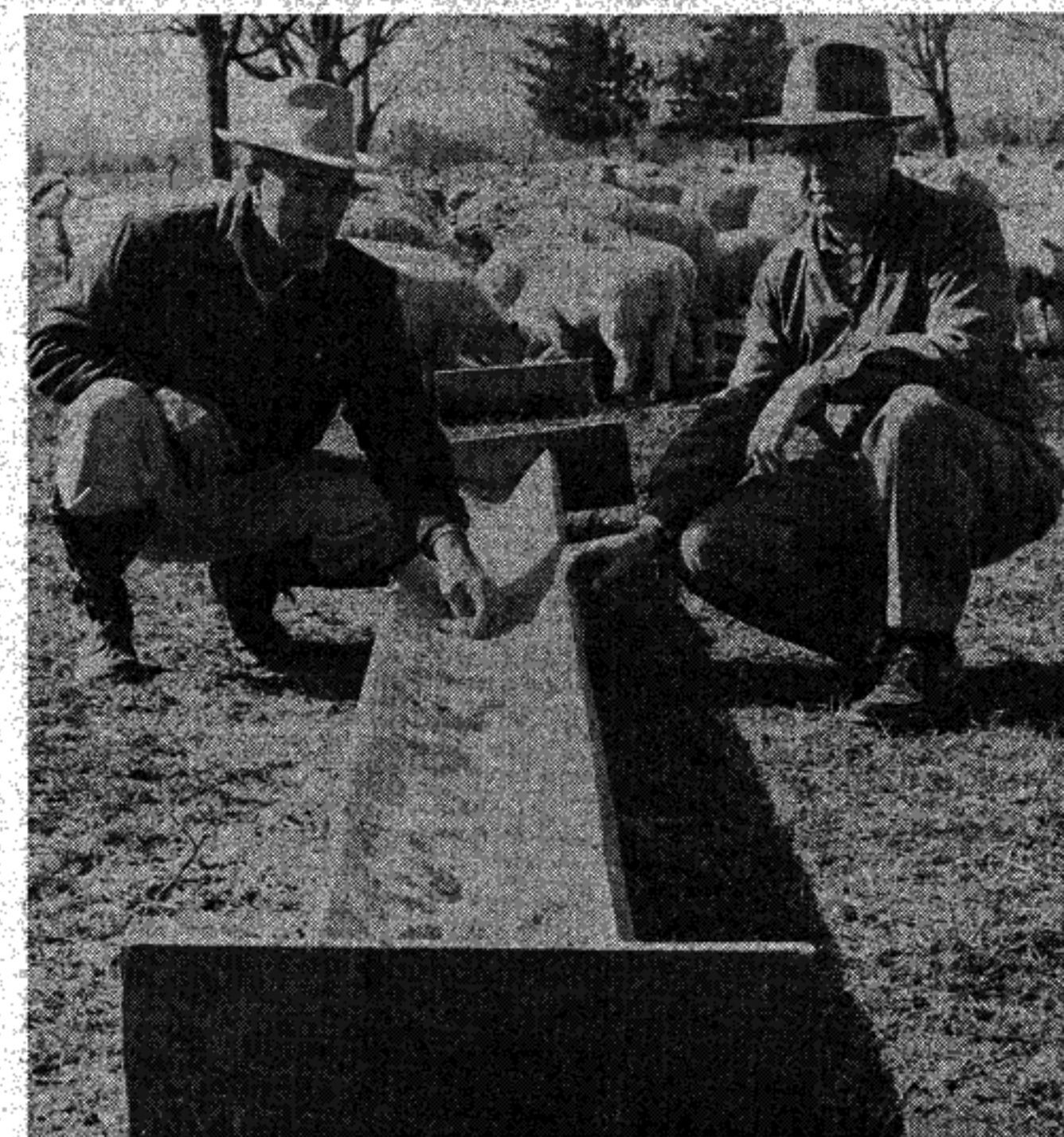
Sumter County farmer plants about twice as many acres as are required per head. When the grazing gets ahead of the sheep, he lets some of his beef cattle graze off the rank growth. "Sheep will fatten better if they have access to young, tender grass," he declared.

While the animals are on grazing, they're drenched twice for control of internal parasites. And just after the April shearing, they are dusted to prevent infestations of scab, mange, flies, and the like. For prevention of internal parasites, the ewes are given two or three more drenchings during the summer and fall.

"Besides controlling parasites, I also keep a close watch for predators," explained Nelson, as he showed Story a large bobcat that he had recently trapped. "However, due to an organized predator control program among all the sheep growers around here, we don't have too much trouble now. Last year, five or six bobcats were trapped on my farm, and not long ago some of my neighbors even caught a coyote and a wolf."

Nelson and his sheep-growing neighbors are also well organized when it comes to marketing their lambs and wool. They all sell wool through the West Alabama Sheep and Wool Growers Association, most of the lambs being marketed through the association's lamb sales. The rest are sold at private sales.

"With the big demand for early spring lambs, the 22 producers in the county—along with other growers over Alabama—always have a ready market for their product," proudly declared Agent Story. "The supply is usually low when our lambs are ready, which means good prices for sheep growers in the state."

Cost-Price Squeeze Calls For Efficiency

If you are a typical farmer, you have been in the cost-price squeeze for some time now.

This tight situation is caused by lower prices being received for farm products while the farmer has to pay higher prices for the things he buys. But regardless of what you call the existing condition, it is clear that every farmer must do some careful planning and use expert management and thrifty living, to make ends meet.

In other words, a farmer has to do everything right and at the right time these days. And there are a number of things that need to be done in April.

April is one of the busiest months of the year. All jobs that have to be done at once—preparing land, fertilizing, planting, and cultivating—seem to fall at this time. All types of supplies are required, and purchasing these is part of a farmer's marketing job. He should be sure to have the right amounts and the right kinds of fertilizers, seeds, insecticides, and farm machinery—and spare parts when they are needed. Having spare parts on hand will save costly delays when the farmer is trying to do each urgent job properly and on time.

Marketing Co-op Aids Randolph Poultrymen

RANDOLPH County poultrymen find that cooperation is the answer to their egg marketing problems.

Last spring nine farmers, along with the county Extension staff, worked out a program whereby a local feed and fertilizer dealer in Wedowee would set up a cooling station and grade and package the eggs. Then a reliable market outlet was found for the poultrymen.

As soon as the details had been worked out, the poultrymen built laying houses and stocked them with pullets. According to Assistant County Agent Claude Moore, the farmers put in 16,000 layers last year. "Before 1958 is over I expect there will be close to 22,000 hens producing eggs for sale through the co-op," says Moore.

Billy Houze of Roanoke Rt. 5 is typical of the Randolph County farmers who have taken advantage of this market. He has a 150-acre farm in the Springfield community and until last year his farming operation consisted

A month or two from now is usually the best time of the year to market slaughter hogs, cattle, and calves. Prices are usually better in May and June because the supply of slaughter animals going to market is less in late spring and early summer than at other times during the year. And you can put on the best gains at the least expense with high-quality spring grazing.

In other words now is a good time for putting on the kind of market finish that catches the buyer's eye when hogs, calves, or cattle go through the sale barn. Aim for a high, good or low choice grade in cattle and calves, and a high percentage of lean meat yield in the hogs. Remember that any excess fat is now worth about half the price per pound of the live hog. The corn it takes to put on this excess fat would most likely represent a loss rather than a gain.

Summer marketings of livestock also help by taking some of the pressure of livestock numbers off the land during the dry summer period. This enables the farmer to get started on a better feed and grazing program for next fall and winter, laying the foundation for another good marketing period a year from now.

mostly of selling manufacturers' milk from nine cows, and raising cotton and corn.

When Houze decided to go into the layer business he cut out cotton and concentrated on grain and feed crops. Later he plans to use a lot of this home-grown feed in the layer ration.

Last June Houze completed a 2000-capacity layer house and stocked it with 14-week-old pullets. Since he did the work himself, the house cost only \$1750; the pullets came to \$2900.

"This seems like a lot of money for any farmer to put out these days, doesn't it?" Houze asked. However, present indications are that the chicks and the feed he has bought will be paid for this month.

The layer operation has been so satisfactory that Houze plans to build another 2000-capacity house this spring. In fact, the pullets for stocking the house have already been purchased and will be delivered in May.

Research Results

from A.P.I. Agricultural Experiment Station

CORN EARWORM CONTROL—Earworms in sweet corn can be controlled by proper application of DDT at two pounds per acre in emulsion sprays. Spraying the ear region at two-day intervals from the time shoots are formed until the silks turn brown takes 10 to 12 sprays and has resulted in over 95 percent worm-free ears in experiments at the Gulf Coast Sub-station in Fairhope.

IRRIGATION UPS COTTON YIELD—An average yield of 1750 pounds of seed cotton per acre was produced where 120 pounds of nitrogen was added without irrigation at the Tennessee Valley Sub-station in 1956 and 1957. With irrigation and the same amount of nitrogen, the yield was 3417 pounds.

GRAIN SORGHUM VARIETIES—The best hybrid grain sorghums tested in Alabama during the last two years have yielded about the same as the recommended open-pollinated varieties. In northern and central Alabama, two hybrids produced more grain than recommended varieties, but their yield advantage appears to be offset by greater lodging. Hybrids have not demonstrated any advantage in southern Alabama. Recommended varieties for northern Alabama are Martin Combine and Redlan; for central Alabama, Combine Sagrain and Early Hegari; and for southern Alabama, Combine Sagrain. Hybrids recommended on a trial basis for northern Alabama are RS 610 and Texas 660, and for central Alabama, DeKalb D-50A and RS 610.

FERTILIZER NEEDS—The soil testing laboratory at Auburn has tested about 43,000 soil samples since 1953. More than half of these soils needed lime for most crops; 75 percent needed an even phosphorus-potash fertilizer, such as 4-12-12; and 18 percent needed a high potash fertilizer, such as 4-8-16. Applying lime and fertilizer according to soil test recommendations is best for any field.

SAGE GROWING—High quality sage can be grown from root cuttings or spring-planted seed. In tests at Auburn, it has grown well under good garden culture. Small branches with fully developed leaves are harvested just before or when bloom buds appear. It is dried in a well ventilated shady place. When well cured and the atmosphere is dry, the sage is stored in an airtight container. Properly handled sage remains useful for several years.

FREEZING FRUIT—Using firm-fleshed, tart varieties and processing at the early soft-ripe stage are the first requirements for high-quality frozen fruits. Auburn tests also revealed that rapid handling is essential. After washing, peeling, stemming, and pitting, most fruits are sliced and covered with a 50 percent sugar solution. Blackberries can be frozen whole or mashed, with or without added sugar or syrup. Careful packaging and sealing before freezing is necessary.

ONIONS NEED MOISTURE—Continuous high levels of soil moisture are needed for high yields of green onions. Droughts of two, four, and six weeks reduced total yields 24, 47, and 61 percent in Auburn tests. Reduction in marketable yields was even greater—27, 53, and 73 percent for the three drought periods.

4-H'er Causes Changes In Family Hog Program

A young Covington County 4-H Club boy brought about changes in the family's hog operation that have meant the difference between success and failure.

It seems that two years ago a lot of pigs were being lost on Marshall Lee's Red Level community farm. Lee's 12-year-old son, Frank, had heard about farrowing jackets in his 4-H Club work. Hoping to find some way to raise more of the pigs the sows were farrowing, he asked Assistant County Agent Gene Sessions for information on constructing a farrowing house.

The 4-H leader sent the youngster several circulars on the subject. Frank then decided that farrowing jackets were just the thing he and his dad needed, so he launched a campaign to get some built on the place. In fact, for several weeks Frank discussed almost nothing else, recalls his father.

During this time, young Frank received a gilt as a birthday present. When her farrowing time drew near, Frank felt that the situation was desperate and gave his father no peace until the elder Lee agreed to build a farrowing pen. Lee went into town for some concrete and a few nails, and the work of converting an old smokehouse into a farrowing house for the sows was started. Using old lumber and doing the work themselves, Frank and his father finished the job at a cost of only \$5.

Heat lamps and guard rails were placed in the farrowing pens to protect the young pigs from the cold and from being mashed. At last Frank stopped worrying about his gilt; he was confident that most of the pigs she brought would be raised.

Frank was right, as it turned out. While only 12 pigs were raised from three litters farrowed before the new facilities were built, 27 were raised from the first three litters to farrow in the house. Since then Frank and his father have been raising an average of nine pigs per litter.

"One sow killed seven of 10 pigs before we built the house," said Frank, "and we raised



10 pigs from the first litter she farrowed in the jacket."

"I wouldn't be without the jackets now," declared Lee. "As the sows get older they get larger, and it's easy for them to mash a little pig."

Lee has a 300-acre farm on Red Level Rt. 2 and raises corn, cotton, peanuts, hogs, and beef cattle. At present he has 13 brood cows, and he and Frank have five brood sows. They plan to enlarge the hog operation to about eight sows.

With 20 acres in oats this winter, Lee had some grazing for his cows and hogs but it

wasn't as good as in the past because of cold weather. He also has 50 acres in permanent pastures for the cows and hogs.

"We made about 45 bushels of corn per acre on 30 acres last summer," said Lee, "and we only have to buy a little supplement for the hogs. With plenty of grain and grazing—in addition to having the farrowing jackets—we make more money from hogs than anything else on the place."

Frank, who was 14 years old in February, has been in 4-H Club work close to four years. He also has projects in corn and forestry, but says he likes his hogs best.

Irrigation Can Be Profitable

WILL irrigation pay on my farm? I am asked that question more than any other. It's a tough one, too. The answer depends on so many things—water source, type of land, labor supply, and kind of crops, to name only a few.

The fact that more farms now seek an answer points to an ever-increasing interest in irrigation as a means to higher yields of better quality products. Ten years ago it was hard to find a farmer using irrigation; in 1957, about 751 systems irrigated 35,156 acres on Alabama farms; within another few years these figures are pretty certain to double or triple.

The rise in irrigation use has been slow but steady—just as it should have been. One of the worst things that could happen is for farmers to jump into irrigation without careful study.

Plan Carefully

A farmer with an irrigation system that can't pay on his place is worse off than a farmer who could use a system profitably but doesn't have one. County agents and other farm leaders have wisely cautioned farmers to go easy and be sure before they get into irrigation.

But, where factors were favorable for success, all of us have recommended irrigation as a profitable operation.

Generally, those farmers with systems are making money on them.

Although irrigation is no cure-all, it does remove one of the big Alabama farming hazards—drouth. And that's terribly important, looking at what's happened not only in recent years but as far back as weather records have been kept.

Alabama's average rainfall during the growing season, March through September, is about 30 inches. Of this amount, 15 inches run off the land because of rainfall intensity. The 15 inches that soak into the ground are 13 inches short of the 28-inch total needed by the average plant from seedling stage to maturity for optimum growth.

Rain Is Short In Summer

The rainfall shortage during the March-September period plus our normally dry falls make Alabama, farming-wise, more like a semi-arid area than the humid area we think of it as being.

Equally hard on farming are the numerous dry spells that seem to come at other wrong times. According to the U. S. Weather Bureau records, 92 times in the past 50 years Alabama went for four weeks or longer with less than an inch of rain. In 183 periods during the same 50 years we were without an inch for three weeks or longer.

Even in 1948, a normal rainfall year, Alabama had nine 15-day periods when less than one-half inch of rain fell.

And so it isn't surprising that more farmers are looking at their irrigation possibilities. They correctly figure that investing to have water when it's wanted and where it's wanted could pay off in a big way.

Although irrigation could make money on thousands of Alabama farms, only about 750 systems have been installed to date. Many farmers who are fully sold on pumping and piping water for their crops haven't felt able to swing the deal.

However, this slow trend toward irrigation is no indication that the practice doesn't have great potential on many farms in the state. On most farms the investment in irrigation has proved to be a wise one. The systems are bringing higher yields of better quality crops and owners are paying off their initial investments in a relatively short time.

If irrigation fits on a farm from every standpoint—land, water supply, labor, crops,

management, and the like—and the owner can finance a system, he certainly should be able to make money on it. On the other hand, I think some farmers have been wise to forego irrigation, because they do not have the right set-up for it.

What Does It Cost?

How much does it cost to apply water on our farmlands? Initial investment in sprinkler irrigation equipment varies from \$50 to \$150 per acre, depending on shape of the field, differences in elevations, type of water supply, distance of water from the field, and other factors. Usually the larger the acreage under irrigation, the lower the cost per acre.

After a farmer has purchased his sprinkler equipment, it will probably cost him from \$1.50 to \$4.75 for every inch of water he puts on an acre. This total operating expense—which includes labor, fuels, oils, interest on investment, and depreciation—usually will run about \$25 per acre per year.

Although this seems like a lot of money, consider it in the light of the returns it will bring. At Auburn, 18 different vegetables irrigated for a 14-year period by the API Experiment Station showed an average yield increase of 85 percent due to irrigation. This increase meant \$122 net profit per acre annually above unirrigated truck crops, after irrigation costs were deducted.

Dairy farmers as well as truck crop growers can use irrigation profitably. Test results show that cows on irrigated pasture had a 43 percent increase in milk production and a 40 percent increase in grazing days per acre.

Corn increases due to irrigation average 40 to 50 bushels per acre. Cotton shows an increased yield of about 1000 pounds per acre of seed cotton. Alfalfa under irrigation generally provides about six good cuttings of hay per year, against an unirrigated two or three cuttings per year.

I want to emphasize that these are averages of several years' observations, including both dry and wet years. During extremely dry years, such as 1954, irrigation makes a great deal more difference in yields.

Who Can Irrigate?

Who can irrigate? Generally speaking, any farmer who has water is in a position to irrigate. Streams seem to offer the best possibility for water supplies over most of the state. Before any irrigation system is purchased, streams should be checked for quantity during the driest part of the year.

Farm ponds are becoming more important as a source of irrigation water. It should be kept in mind, however, that our average pond will lose about 12 feet of water each year through evaporation and seepage. Thus, if we have a pond exactly 12 feet deep overall and begin the year with the pond full, it will be dry at the end of the year, provided no rainfall occurs and no water runs into the pond. Ponds that are planned for irrigation purposes should be fed by a good strong spring or by drainage from an extremely large area.

Deep wells eight inches in diameter, or larger, are popular in areas with a sufficient amount of underground water. These areas include the Tennessee Valley, the lower coastal plain, and part of the Black Belt.

In addition to adequate water supply, it is also necessary for a farmer to have good soil and to manage it properly. For example, corn in a field crop rotation requires 21,000 gallons of water to make a bushel. Corn in a legume rotation, where organic matter is turned under each year, requires only 5,600 gallons of water to mature a bushel.

Along the Way

THE recent meeting of Alabama home demonstration agents at Tuscaloosa recalled that foods was the first home demonstration project, more than half a century ago. It began with tomato production, canning, serving; and spread to other foods, clothing, home management, and other projects concerning farm living.

We must, of course, have food. Food consumption of American adults averages 1500 pounds per year. Stated differently, you and I eat our weight in food about every seven weeks, or seven times a year.

Home demonstration agents have been effective in improving food in every way, beginning with production and ending with proper diet. People are healthier, they are living longer, and they are living better because of this work.

People are what they eat. Therefore, we should eat the right foods and in the proper amounts every day.

Alabama farmers keep looking for something which they can produce and sell profitably. They prefer something that is without controls or allotments.

Sheep farmers who met at Huntsville said that sheep offer such an opportunity; and a good one. Two-thirds of the wool that we consume in this country is imported; and mutton consumption is too low for its quality as a food.

Soil and climate in Alabama are favorable to sheep production; and sheep do well with other kinds of farming.

For many years I've talked with farmers who have sheep. All of them have told me that they make more net money on sheep than any other part of their operations.

But sheep require enough feed, grazing, and good management. As compared to other livestock, they are not difficult. In fact they are the best invitation I know to Alabama farmers to produce something and sell it profitably.

Hogs offer farmers another good opportunity to produce and sell a good product. G. B. Phillips, our specialist in Auburn, keeps reminding us that hogs are adaptable to most Alabama farms. Like other livestock, they require enough feed, plus good management. Money necessary to get started with hogs isn't big. See your county agent.

The Lawrence's Mill community in Fayette County is another example of how farm people win by working together. They did it this time by producing an average of 449 pounds of lint cotton per acre on 763 acres, making them state winner in cotton improvement. They received a cash prize of \$1,000 from the Alabama Textile Manufacturing Association and will use the money to build a club house.

But cotton isn't the only community project at Lawrence's Mill. In fact, people there think, study, and work together for better farming and better living in every way.

There are, of course, many other very fine community clubs in Alabama; but more are needed because people accomplish more where they work together for the solution of their mutual problems.

Young Barbour County Farmer Looks To The Future

TRUE, these are hard days for most Alabama farmers. But there is no pessimism on Henry Gray's Barbour County farm concerning the future of his operation.

Gray, a young agriculture graduate of Alabama Polytechnic Institute, is gradually turning 1800 acres of land on Eufaula Rt. 3 into one of the finest farms in the area.

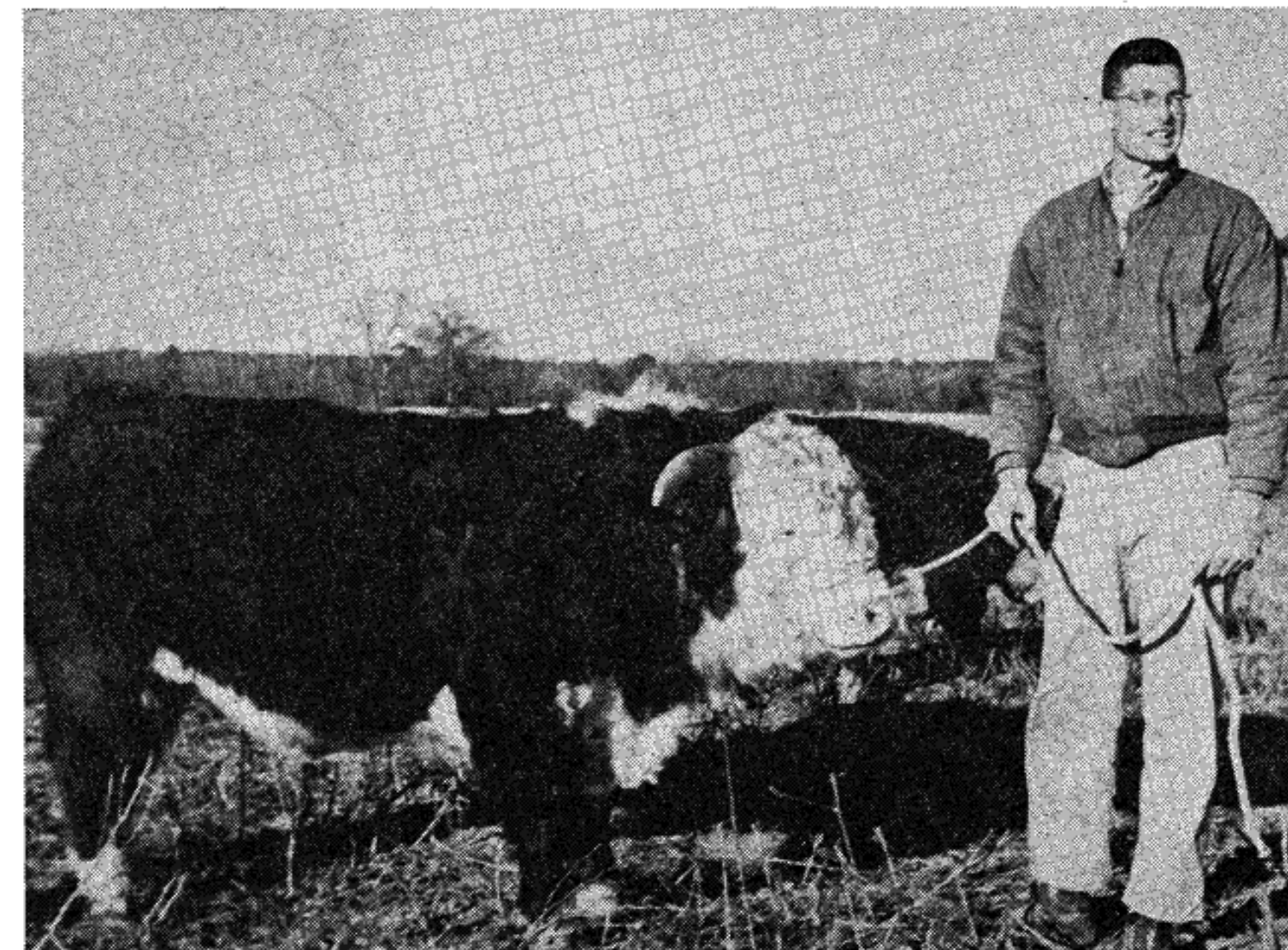
"Henry has made a lot of progress with the farm since he took it over in 1954," said County Agent Jess Walton. And the signs of progress are on every hand. Grain bins have been added, land has been cleared, and an outstanding hay and grazing program has been developed to enable Gray to carry on a hog and beef cattle operation.

Some of the latest improvements on the place are in the cattle and grazing programs. Gray has some 130 commercial brood cows, and this winter he went to Texas to purchase some registered Hereford stock to start a purebred beef cattle operation.

Gray explained that he bought 58 purebred Hereford heifers and a fine Hereford bull from the Pronger Brothers Ranch in Stratford, Texas. The bull will be two years old in May and weighs in at 1,430 pounds. He plans to expand this purebred operation and cut down on the commercial herd in proportion.

However, despite the fact that Gray is going into the purebred business, he has been improving his commercial herd. Undesirable bulls have been culled, and good bulls have been added. At present there are nine Hereford bulls on the place. And Gray and Al Jordan, who helps operate the farm, are starting a record system for the beef cattle. All cows and calves will be marked and complete information kept to determine which are the best animals.

How about the grazing? Well, an 85-acre field of wheat was grazed mighty close by Gray's Angus and Hereford brood cows and their calves, making it evident that his winter grazing—like that of most other farmers—



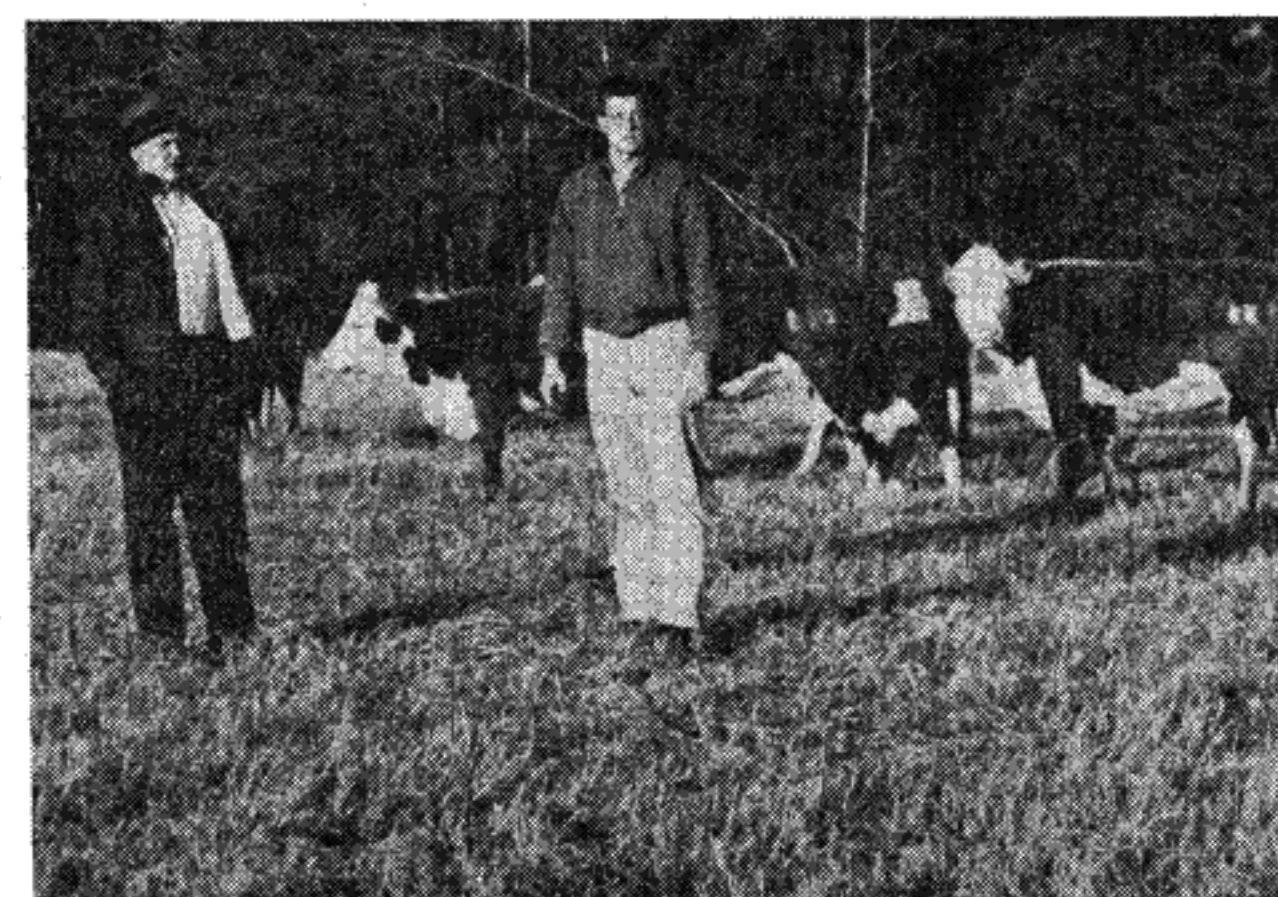
was hit hard. Still, the livestock was in mighty good shape.

"I was lucky to have a good supply of coastal bermuda hay on hand," explained Gray. "The 130 tons of hay we baled last year really saved the day."

Gray went on to say that he has cleared land to put in another 60 acres of coastal this spring to go with the 140 acres he has already established. "In addition to the hay, the coastal gives a lot of grazing every summer," declared Gray, "and I consider it one of the most important crops on the place."

A young man who decided to take up farming because he likes the out-of-doors, Gray is happy with his chosen business. "And the fine progress Henry is making is good reason for his happiness," declared Agent Walton.

Needed In Livestock Operation

WEEDS are robbers. Kill 'em!
All farmers realize the necessity of controlling weeds in row crops—that is, if they want to harvest a good crop. But, in order to develop a successful livestock program, farmers must also realize the necessity of controlling weeds in pastures and treating pastures as a crop. Weeds rob good pasture plants of water, plant nutrients, growing room, and sunlight, and they lower the quality of livestock products.

Until recently, the mower has been the only means available to the farmer for controlling weeds in pastures. Thanks to manufacturers and research, we now have 2,4-D—a chemical which, properly used, controls most broadleaf weeds that infest clover-grass permanent pastures. Furthermore, machinery manufacturers have developed equipment for applying the spray material. And our agricultural experiment stations have given us the know-how.

The application of one pound (acid equivalent) of 2,4-D amine per acre, mixed with 15 to 20 gallons of water as a broadcast spray, will control such broadleaf weeds as bitterweed, dog fennels (including summer cedar), dock, marsh elder, verbena, ragweed, coffee-weed, shepherd's purse, plantain, and most other annual broadleaf plants.

Start In May

The first treatment should be made during May, or when weeds are young and growing rapidly. Repeat the application as often as necessary. However, one application usually gives adequate control of bitterweed for the season. Dewberry and St. Johns-wort will be partially controlled. Make additional applications for these if needed. Horse nettle (tread-soft briar) is not controlled by use of 2,4-D.

Pasture grasses and legumes should be well established. Seedlings will be killed or severely injured by 2,4-D. Well established stands of dallis grass, bermuda grass, bahia, white clover, lespedeza, or black medic are not injured to any significant degree by the recommended treatment. Growth of these plants may be retarded for a short period, but they quickly recover. Crimson clover, vetch, hopclover, and caley peas will be killed by 2,4-D.

Treatments should not be made during long drought periods, or any time when weeds are not growing rapidly. If weeds are allowed to mature, it is best to mow and spray when new growth is tender and developing rapidly.

Where pastures are near cotton fields, it may be best to spray immediately before cotton planting time. In tests conducted by the Mississippi Experiment Station, excellent control of bitterweed has been obtained by the use of one pound of 2,4-D amine per acre in 10 to 20 gallons of water, applied as a broadcast pre-emergence spray in March or April—or just before cotton planting time. Farmers who have pastures infested with bitterweeds and cannot spray during summer because of the danger of injuring nearby cotton should give early spraying a trial.

To control Cherokee rose in white clover-dallis grass pastures, remove top growth of old roses. When new growth reaches 12 to 18 inches, spray with one pound of 2,4-D amine per acre in about 20 gallons of water. Repeat the application two or three times during the summer, or as often as growth is 12 to 18 inches long. To control Cherokee rose in common lespedeza-dallis grass pastures, use two pounds of 2,4-D per acre. Delay the first application until about May or after common lespedeza is past the seedling stage. Follow the same procedure as recommended for white clover-dallis grass pastures.

Take Precautions

When using 2,4-D certain precautions should be taken.

1. Read labels and instructions carefully. Be sure to check the amount of acid equivalent per gallon. Use recommended amounts.
 2. Spray when the air is fairly still, to avoid drift and get a more even spread on weeds.
 3. Use the amine form in preference to ester forms of 2,4-D. The amine form is much safer. If a high volatile ester is used, the danger of vapors drifting to nearby fields lasts for several days.
 4. Operate sprayer at minimum pressure and fix nozzle as close to the plants as possible to get complete spray coverage. Do not use nozzles that "mist."
 5. Equipment with which you have sprayed 2,4-D or related compounds should not be used to apply insecticides to cotton, alfalfa, soybeans, or other easily damaged crops.
- For information on the use of chemicals for controlling weeds in corn, cotton, grain sorghum, and other crops on your farm, see your county agent. Ask for Extension Circular 507, "Chemical Weed Control on Alabama Farms." This publication also gives recommendations for killing brush and small trees along ditch banks and fence rows, as well as recommendations for controlling bermuda grass and Johnson grass.



SIX steps to get most out of every dollar spent for fertilizer: 1. Soil test in order to use the right kind and amount of fertilizer. 2. Maintain correct soil acidity by liming. 3. Prepare a good seedbed. 4. Use plenty of certified seed to get and keep a good stand. 5. Plant on time. 6. Apply fertilizer below and to the side of seed.

TOO often pastures are overgrazed in the early part of the year and never have time to recover.

BUDWORM damage occurs most often in early corn and bottomland corn; wireworms are worse in sandy land. Both best can be controlled with aldrin or heptachlor mixed in fertilizer and applied before planting at the per-acre rate of one pound for budworms and two pounds for wireworms.

HOW many pigs do you save, raise, and sell per sow per year? Better check up if you aren't sure. These days, the goal should be to sell at least 16 top hogs from every sow every year.

START early to control pasture weeds. Spraying in May with one pound of 2,4-D amine per acre in 15 gallons of water will go a long way toward stopping bitterweeds and other easy-to-kill weeds. If you are afraid of the spray drifting to nearby cotton fields, treat in April before cotton is planted.

STARR millet makes lots of good green forage. Try to have one-fourth to one-half acre for each cow, either dairy or beef; one acre for each six head of 500-pound steers; one acre for each 20 shots; one acre for each three sows and pigs.

IT pays to plant cotton just as early as the weather permits. Each day's delay after the proper planting date for your area costs you 10 pounds of cotton.

COOLING rooms for eggs don't have to be expensive, but they should hold eggs at 60 to 65 degrees and at a humidity of 70 to 80 percent. With hot weather not far off, now's the time to get the cooling room ready.

TO meet competition, it seems that Alabama broiler growers will have to average a pound of meat for each 2.5 pounds of feed used. With warm weather approaching, many producers will have a feed conversion figure of 2.2 (a pound of broiler meat for 2.2 pounds of feed). Tests at the Arkansas Experiment Station prove that a yearly average of 2.3 to 2.4 is possible and practical with present day feeds.

MANY carefully conducted experiments have shown that it does not pay to feed ground ear corn to growing-finishing pigs, shots, and hogs. Sure, they'll eat it, but you lose the cost of grinding and end up with slower gains than when shelled or ear corn is fed. Adding molasses to ground ear corn makes it a little more tasty but does not make it a good ration.

Fat Stock Shows Are A Sure Sign Spring Is Here

A sure sign of spring is fat, sleek, well groomed beef calves being loaded on the family truck for the annual trip to the county or district fat stock show.

County shows are being held all over the state now, according to W. H. Gregory, API Extension beef cattle specialist, and the big district events will be held during April and May. "The importance of these shows cannot be stressed too much," declared Gregory. "In addition to focusing attention on the fine cattle produced in Alabama, they give incentive and training to our fine young people who will be the cattle producers of the future."

Just how do these young people benefit from such programs? Well, let us take a look into the background of a county or district fat stock show.

The 4-H or FFA boys and girls select their calves months before the show. They try to pick animals that will develop into top contenders for the grand championship awards at the spring shows; and they gain valuable experience when they find out why their calves did not measure up to the best in the show.

During the long fall and winter months, the youngsters look after their calves and feed them carefully. Then, several weeks before show time they begin training the animal for the show ring. Many hours are spent leading the calf around the farm yard. And this can be tough at times. Some calves even have to be taught to lead by pulling them along with a tractor. And some can never be trained to lead, leaving the youngster without an entry at show time.

A few days before the show, the boys and girls begin washing and grooming their calves. And before they enter the ring, the big 1000-pound hunk of beef has his hair combed and curled to make him look better to the expert judge.

It looks simple when the youngster eases around the show ring with his animal, keeping his eye on the judge and setting his calf just right every time the judge tells them to halt. But everyone associated with these events knows how many hours of hard work is behind every poised performance in the show ring.

"Every boy or girl who works at training a calf is a winner, whether or not the animal receives the championship rosette," declared Gregory.

Typical of the thousands of rural youngsters entering the fat stock shows are Fred and Iverson Blackmon, 13-year-old twin sons



of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Blackmon, shown on this page. The Eufaula Rt. 3 boys enter this fine Hereford in the Barbour County Fat Stock Show and Sale in May.

Iverson, left, and Fred have been 4-H club members for four years and have been showing beef calves for two years. They take turns showing the animals, but both work with the calves and do a good job of it, according to Assistant County Agent Jasper Hayles.

The two Blackmon boys seem to have become good friends with their calf, as do most of the showmen. In fact, when a boy or girl has to part company with his animals after

the sale, it is quite often a sad occasion. Some even weep openly when they take the halter off the calf and turn it over to the buyer.

The next time there is a fat stock show in your vicinity, go out and watch the fine rural boys and girls perform with their calves. It will be well worth the time.
